**SEXUAL EXPLOITATION: LIFE OF A SEX TRADE WORKER**

Juanita is a woman who transforms her feelings of powerlessness into action. She is a woman of two cultures, African Canadian and Cree of Enoch First Nation. Juanita has survived inter-generational trauma, addictions, situational crimes, sexual abuse, childhood trauma and sexual exploitation. Her presentations inspire and support people and through this she is a symbol of resilience and a role model for making positive changes. Her presentation leads to discussions around scenarios and solutions to empower oneself against sexual exploitation.

#### **12:00-1:00 pm GANG AWARENESS**

Presenter: Clayton Bird, RCMP K Division Aboriginal Policing,

This workshop will outline activity streams targeting youth, parents, and the general community to address a number of risk factors among youth ages 7 to 17, who are experiencing increased violence, addictions and gang activity.

## Risk Assessment for BOS

**Inherent Level of Risk:** All activities, regardless of the complexity or simplicity of the action, have an inherent level of risk. Variable factors such as cognitive ability and developmental maturity, skill level, previous experience of the students and teacher, weather conditions, facilities, and available equipment may all affect the level of risk of any activity.

**Travel (to and from):** Will require students to travel on the highway and in town and settlements. Injuries can occur during loading/unloading usually taking the form of slips trips and falls. While traveling on any roadway there is also the possibility of collision, leaving the road, or malfunction of the vehicle. Possible related injuries include, but are not limited to sprains, strains, broken bones, exposure to inclement weather, or in extreme cases, internal injury, head injury, or death. In order to limit these risks, students should wear appropriate footwear, use caution while loading and unloading, and remain seated while the bus is in motion. Students should also avoid any behavior which would distract the bus driver, or any other behavior which might interfere with the safe operation of the vehicle. **Note:** in the event of road conditions which may make travel unnecessarily dangerous the trip will be cancelled and, if possible, rescheduled for a later date. Students should bring outdoor clothing appropriate for weather in the event of an accident or vehicle malfunction.
